Food Security Situation*

- Low food production, poverty and large-scale internal displacement due to conflict threaten Colombians' food security.
- Threats to rural populations by illegal armed groups restrict movement and limit access to markets and agricultural land, and consequently to food and other goods.
- The humanitarian crisis facing Colombia after more than 50 years of conflict makes it one of the countries with the highest level of IDPs in the world. Many who are forced to flee their homes due to conflict do not register as IDPs because they are afraid of being stigmatized or threatened. WFP is addressing the needs of the displaced and vulnerable populations who cannot be reached through government humanitarian and social sector programs.
